For a time, she was Dean of Women and Piano Instructor in the Music School at the University of Illinois. Her husband was Arthur Hill Daniels (1865–1940) who was head of the Philosophy Department, Dean of the College of Liberal Arts and Sciences, Dean of the Graduate School, and acting President of the University of Illinois. She died in Urbana, Illinois.
